



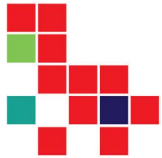

About Kyoung's Pacific Beat

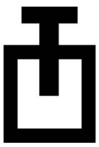

API Rainbow Parents of PFLAG NYC was founded in 2012 with a dedicated group for Asian & Pacific Islander LGBT People and their Families within PFLAG NYC chapter. BAAD! is home to Arthur Aviles Typical Theatre (AATT) and the Bronx Dance Coalition and was founded by Arthur Aviles and Charles Rice-Gonzalez in 1998 in Hunts Point. BAAD! moved to Westchester Square in October 2013 to a gothic revivalist building on the grounds of St. Peter's Church. BAAD!/AATT receive support from The NYC Department of Cultural Affairs, The SHS Foundation, The Mertz Gilmore Foundation, The New York Community Trust, The Liberty Fund of the New York Community Trust, The Howard Gilman Foundation, The Lambent Fund of the Tides Foundation, The New York State Council on the Arts, Councilmember Jimmy Vacca, The Jerome Foundation and private donations.

CLAGS (The Center for LGBTQ Studies) provides a platform for intellectual leadership in addressing issues that affect lesbian, gay, bisexual transgender, and queer individuals and other sexual and gender minorities. We provide a range of political, social, educational, and cultural programming and work in coalition with other community organizations to educate and promote dialogue on issues of race, sexuality, gender, and health.

The **Indie Theater Fund** protects, sustains and strengthens independent theater presented in the five boroughs of New York City. In addition to granting vital financial resources to theater companies and individual artists, we stimulate the growth of independent theater by seeding projects that support and develop the community as a whole.

Korean Cultural Center New York (Cultural Partner) was inaugurated in 1979. Previously known as the Korean Cultural Service New York, the Korean Cultural Center New York

is a branch of the Ministry of Culture, Sports and Tourism (MCST) of the Republic of Korea. Long Table Series: Official Media Partner

Culturebot is a publication devoted to critical thought about experimental performance. We use publishing as an act of legitimization for a marginalized sector of the art world. We do not publish traditional reviews, but seek to enter into dialogue with work through critical thought that takes on various creative forms. Works published include personal responses to performance, long form and short form interviews with artists, post-show conversations, visual responses, essays, poems, videos, and podcasts. We strive for our writing to point out from the performance rather than pointing at it. (What is a work of performance doing? What are we thinking about while witnessing? What does it say about our field? What does it say about our world?) We consider what resonates beyond the work rather than "did I like it?" or "is it good or bad?". Our contributors acknowledge their place as artists writing about their peers and seek to remove the barrier between critic and maker. Culturebot seeks to expand how we talk about art and challenges our notions of acceptable forms for discussion.

Launched in 2003 as a blog for Performance Space 122 in New York City, Culturebot has operated independently since 2007. It has grown into a 21st century arts organization, presenting performances, convening conversations, building community, and supporting artists, critical discourse, and professional development. We aspire to be deeply knowledgeable and widely accessible; we believe that criticism is a creative practice and critical discourse is essential for a vibrant and engaged cultural ecology.
